TOWN CENTRE AND COVID RECOVERY PROJECT LAUNCHED

Lydney Town Council is pleased to announce that Place Studio of Bristol has been awarded the contract to lead on a Regeneration and Covid Recovery Project for our town.

Lydney Town Council has allocated £42,000 in its Budget for this project, the whole of which should be considered as our 'pump priming' contribution towards delivery of the Regeneration Strategy. While this includes the



consultant's fees we will be looking for the majority of the budget to be spent on actual projects. Place Studio has been asked to identify promising incoming streams and partner organisations for work in the remainder of 2021/22.

The objective is to work with the Town Council and other public, private and voluntary sector bodies as well as local residents to develop an effective working regeneration partnership.

With no clear end date for the pandemic, Place Studio will put in place arrangements for community engagement in a Covid-safe way. Inevitably this will mean more online consultation and less face-to-face discussion with residents and businesses, but with no alternative, plans need to be made before the

Pandemic ends, in order for whatever proposals come about to be made ready.



Vaughan Thompson of Place Studio says: "We are ready to start work immediately and intend to start making contact with residents and businesses in March."

The Mayor of Lydney, Councillor Walter Leach said: "Place Studio were selected by the Council after a series of presentations by hopeful bidders all of whom brought a strong case to the table. Place Studio stood out by offering a wealth of experience and a track record of success in similar circumstances to those

here in Lydney. I am particularly excited by this engagement as it has been a long-term goal to see the Council seriously investing in developing an exciting future for Lydney. The Town Council cannot do this alone and we need to work with all the key partners including other Councils and agencies, the business community and of course our residents, who will be a key influence in whatever we do."



March 2020 lockdown, while a dreadful blow to the many users of the Centre, gave the Committee time to make the building Covid secure, by installing hand sanitisers, a one-way system, fogging sanitiser as part of the increased cleaning routine, 'QR' code signs and other signage.



Other work included:

- ⇒ Sanding and resealing the lovely wooden floor in the hall
- ⇒ Painting and decorating the corridor
- ⇒ Painting the outside, with help from Enovert Entrust
- ⇒ Replacing the sinks and toilets in the ladies and disabled toilet, thanks to the Barnwood Trust.

With the challenges of the 2020 lockdowns and restrictions Lydney
Town & Training Band has been busy at securing their future. We
have found new ways to get our members playing together and

Facebook for our members.





Our band room has had its most extensive **renovation** in twenty years including insulation being fitted, redecorating and the installation of a new security fence. Well what a year 2020 turned out to be. Due to the pandemic The Forest Foodbank team had to adapt to a new process to enable us to still reach those in crisis, we went from being able to meet those needing our services face to face to having a socially distanced food parcel delivery system.

During 2020 we fed 745 adults and 476 children in and around Lydney.

The local community of Lydney stepped up to the challenge of donating during 2020 by using the Tesco, Lydney in store cage. This giving was 24% of our donated total into our warehouse.

That is an incredible 8.6 tonnes (around the weight of 14 highland cows)



Tesco, Lydney also donated an extra 4.6 tonnes of their Basics range during lockdown. So far in 2021 we have fed 35 adults and 31 children.

Lydney Dial a Ride wheels keep turning

Even in the depths of a pandemic local Charity, Lydney Dial a Ride continues its journey. From the first lockdown in March 2020 Lydney Dial a Ride was classed as an essential service, ensuring people could still access essential shops and medical appointments. In this current lockdown we are taking key worker children to school each day and operating the six rural bus routes linking villages and hamlets to their local town.



Most importantly we are making sure that people can access the local Covid Vaccination Hub in Dockham Road, Cinderford to get those vital inoculations.

If anyone struggles to access public transport or do not have their own vehicle they can very quickly join Lydney Dial a Ride. A telephone conversation is all it takes to join the Charity and we want as many people as possible to know we are still here, waiting to help.

Lydney Dial a Ride is a registered Community Transport Charity with a mix of wheelchair accessible vehicles and volunteer drivers, covering Lydney, Coleford, Cinderford and the surrounding areas.

Lydney Town Hall Trust

The Town Hall similar to other community leisure and entertainment venues has remained closed throughout the Covid 19 restriction period from March 2020 to early 2021. A packed calendar of events for 2020 was decimated, taking away our main source of revenue used to maintain the grand Victorian building as one of Lydney's main landmarks.

The volunteers have, when Covid rules have allowed, been able to carry out minor repairs and ensured the Hall has virus precautions in place for when the venue is occupied, which has mainly been for NHS Blood collection service.

As to the future, we remain optimistic and have many of the postponed 2020 events rescheduled for 2021 and 2022. We expect a surge of interest from Lydney and the surrounding area who have had few options to support local community, leisure and entertainment events.

We are grateful that the Government support grants have been available through the Forest of Dean District Council. This certainly has been a lifesaver for the Trust.




The main hall room with sprung wooden floor

Lydney Town Council Environmental Working Party

As the evenings begin to draw out, and the first signs of spring appear in our gardens, we can look forward to the appearance of the first spring flowers. Over the winter, our ground staff team have been working hard planting bulbs, primroses and shrubs to give us a glorious show later in the year.



The environmental working party have been exploring ways in which wildflowers can be introduced into more areas, particularly on the roadside verges at the "gateways", the entry and exits to the town. Wildflowers can enhance our enjoyment of our outdoor spaces, but they are not only appreciated by us human residents. Wildflowers attract important insect populations, which themselves help to sustain other wildlife. Birds and small mammals enjoy the seeds, and the wildflowers provide useful wildlife cover.

Over the next few years, Lydney Town Council will be looking at the green spaces we manage, both large and small, seeing if we are making the most of them and if they can be managed in a more environmen-

tally friendly way. This could mean reducing the use of weed killers, especially glyphosate, mowing some areas less and encouraging diverse wildlife habitats. It could even involve converting some of our spaces into mini community orchards or growing spaces.



So look out for changes in our roadside verges and in our large and small green spaces. if something looks a bit neglected, it could be that we are trialling a new mowing schedule, or a different method of controlling weeds. Look out for signs, as we will try and tell you what we are up to as much as we can.



After a tumultuous 2020 for everyone Lydney Hub are looking towards 2021 with wide eyed anticipation, the culmination of a years worth of fundraising is taking shape and the next stage of the Hub building is within sight.

Last year saw Lydney Youth Hub move its service into the new building for the first time, while operating at reduced numbers due to guideline restrictions we received overwhelming interest in a service of the provided in the service of the serv

in our sessions with evenings being fully booked within hours of being advertised.

One of our first priorities in developing the Hub building will be the completion of the Art studio and Media suite, this will provide new and exciting opportunities for the Young People attending our sessions as well as giving us the ability to expand our service as guideline's allow.



Moving forward into this year we hope that we can resume our live Youth sessions as soon as possible, we have already begun planning for a free meals event and started preparations for available activities.

The decennial census is almost upon us.

Households across Lydney will be asked to take part in the nationwide survey of housing and the population. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

Information from the digital-first census will help decide how services are planned and funded in your local area. This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, housing or new bus routes.

Households will receive a letter with a unique access code in the post, allowing them to complete their questionnaire online. Paper questionnaires on request.
